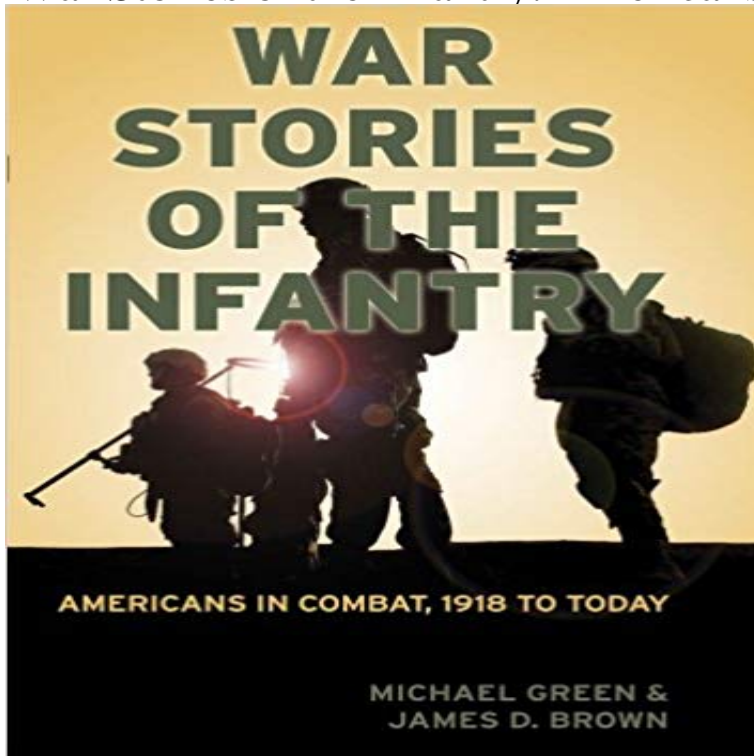


## War Stories of the Infantry: Americans in Combat, 1918 to Today
