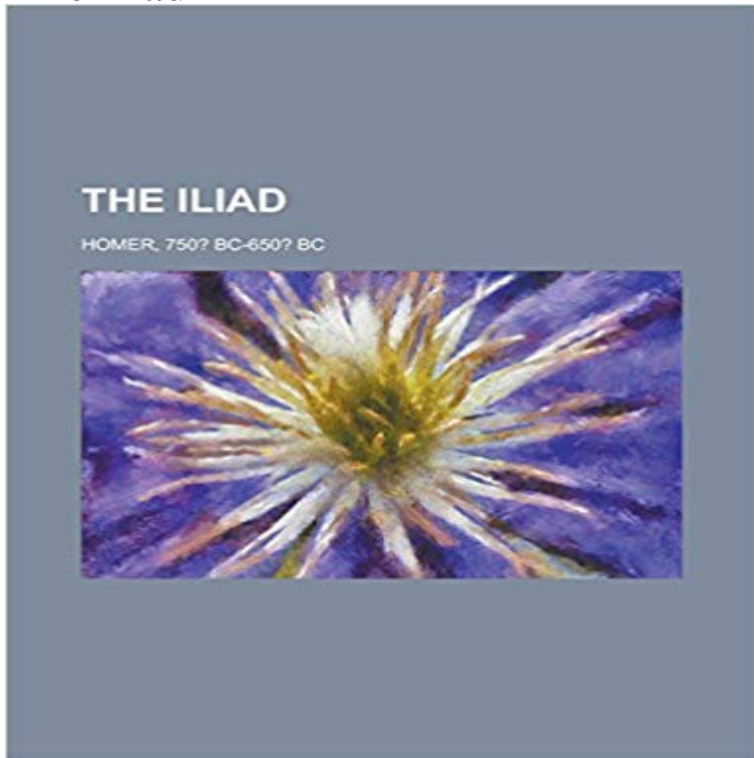


# The Iliad
